TOPIC 'A' {2 hours} Scalp Acupuncture (MS system)

Scalp acupncture is a form of acupuncture that involves inserting thin needles into specific points on the scalp. It is based on the principles of traditional Chinese medicine and neuroanatomy. It is a modern acupuncture technique, to modulate brain function and treat various neurological and other conditions by stimulating the corresponding brain areas.

TOPIC 'B' {4 hours} Ethics & Privacy in TCM

The ethical principle of justice demands fair and equitable treatment for all patients. This includes ensuring that all individuals have equal access to confidentiality protections and that decisions about information sharing are made without discrimination or bias.

The Health Insurance Portability & Accountability Act (HIPAA) is a federal law enacted in 1996. The primary purpose is ensuring that individuals have control over their medical records, and to promote the efficient flow of healthcare data while maintaining condidentiality.
